HEAD OF SCHOOL'S MESSAGE

This week we have been thinking about what it means to be a 'role model' to others. In assembly last Friday, many of our De Lacy Stars were given the 'Star of the Week' certificate for always following the De Lacy Promises and being good role models to others. During lunch time break on Wednesday, I was particularly proud of a group of Y5 and Y6 children who showed that they were good role models by encouraging a younger child to play in a game of 'Hot Potato'. As well as this, some of the older children have also enjoyed reading to their younger peers at lunchtimes in our outside 'reading club'.

There has been lots going on around school with the first of our sporting events happening on Tuesday. Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the match myself but Miss Rowley and Miss Middleditch could not wait to tell me how well behaved our children were and what team spirit they showed.

This week in Reception children have been learning about the story 'Zog'. They have been painting pictures of the characters from the story and building a house for him in the outdoor provision. In maths the children have been making repeating patterns looking at size and colour.



KS1 have been reading The Highway Rat. They have been making sensible predictions from looking at the front cover and have also looked at the characters in detail. They have written some great character descriptions. Keep up the good work!

Years 3 and 4 have continued to read George's marvellous medicine by Roald Dahl. They have linked their learning to Science identifying bones and learning about the function of muscles and different organs in the body.

In year 5/6 the children have begun to explore persuasive writing and have started to consider how they would persuade people to attend their own theme park. In year 5 the children have been continuing to work on place value, year 6 have focused on the four operations. They have also researched a historical British event using technology.

MFL at De Lacy

In MFL lessons, pupils are encouraged to express their ideas and thoughts in another language, and to understand and respond to its speakers, both in speech and in writing. Language teaching provides the foundation for learning further languages and develops the platform for the children's transition to secondary school. At De Lacy Primary, our children learn Spanish from Year 3 to Year 6. Spanish lessons are sequenced with the support of our local secondary schools who offer masterclasses and cultural events. Children initially learn basic greetings and vocabulary about their family. In years 5 and 6 learning progresses to extended conversation, scenario-based learning and an increased repertoire of decoding and comprehension skills.
